High Impact Plant Combinations – Laura Eyer, Clackamas County Master Gardener



This program will be presented by our very own Laura Eyer, a Clackamas County Master Gardener for 30 years. She has produced many of our 10-Minute University™ videos on ornamental plant design.

Laura will show us how to achieve High Impact Plant Combinations by employing three important principles that are the cornerstone of high impact plantings. She will tell us how to use the color wheel to achieve the right combinations and how to compose a planting that will enhance the tapestry of the garden.

Paul Baker was chairman of the Fair and ran it extremely well. To the Chairmen who were involved in the various segments of the fair: thank you for your outstanding effort restarting our Spring Garden Fair.

The following is Paul's report of the fair:

"We Did It! Spring Garden Fair 2022 was a great success thanks to 25 chair folks, and 200 volunteers who logged over 2500 hours over 5 days. We did have some weather challenges on Saturday that dampened some guests and flooded Plant Check but these didn't have a significant impact. Attendance this year was 7200 paid guests, down a bit from the last fair in 2019, where we drew over 7900 attendees.

Overall, the fair was a great comeback after being gone for the two COVID years. Raffle, Potting Station and New Plant Introductions were as popular as ever. We missed 10 Minute University classes, Children's Activities and the many display booths in 4H Hall, but look forward to having them back next year. The financial benefits from this event fund the chapter and allow us to continue to donate to worthy charitable causes going forward. Our contract for with the Canby Events center has been renewed for another 5 years."

Sunday Afternoon we met Gayl and Paul Ratigan who were involved in starting the fair in 1984. They attended our May chapter meeting and Gayl told us what was involved in starting this up.
