Bond Measure #3-613

We want to bring awareness of a bond that will impact Master Gardeners and Extension. Clackamas Community College proposed Bond Measure which is on the November ballot. What got our attention is: “Enhanced partner and community connections.” Included in the proposed enhancements is a new Extension office on the CCC Campus. Cost: The Proposed \$120-million bond, if passed, would renew the existing tax rate of 25 cents per \$1,000 of assed value. Please be aware of this bond when voting this November. The November lecture: Characteristics and Natural History of Conifers in the Pine Family by Elizabeth Price

This talk will focus on the pine family (Pinaceae). The foliage, cone, bud, and bark characteristics that differentiate spruce, true fir, hemlock, Douglas-fir, larch, and true cedar will be highlighted. A bit of history on each of these groups of conifers will also be presented. Elizabeth Price has been a certified Master Gardener since 2008 and has been leading workshops on conifers for other Master Gardeners and for the public for over a decade. This interest in conifers lead to her writing a book on the subject, Native and Ornamental Conifers in the Pacific Northwest: Identification, Botany, and Natural History
