### *Tips for planning your Open Garden:*

- Choose a day or date when your garden looks its best.
- Set reasonable visiting hours (10 AM - 4 PM or 11 AM - 5 PM).
- Place clear signage at the front to direct visitors
- Ensure hoses and other obstacles are rolled up for safety.
- Plant tags are optional.
- Refreshments are optional.
- Include pictures documenting the garden's progress if available.
- Relax, wear comfortable attire.
- Be prepared to discuss your garden.
- Remember: perfection is not required.
