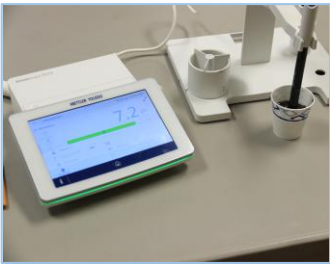

Clackamas County Master Gardener Assoc. Year in Review

2025 was a busy and productive year for our chapter members. The chapter is involved in many activities and events throughout the year. We offer public education via 10-Minute University programs, and in-person events in the spring and fall: Garden Discovery Day, Spring Garden Fair and Fall into Gardening. We also offer free services with our Soil pH Testing and garden clinics, and food donations with our Grow an Extra Row gardens. Members have the choice to participate and volunteer at the End of the Oregon Trail in the Pioneer Garden or help maintain the gardens at the Hopkins Demonstration Forest. Countless hours are spent on these activities, and our community is better for it. Below is a summary of some of that work - but it is by no means the whole story. Garden Discovery Day and Fall into Gardening returned in 2025

Garden Discovery Day in March was a success, with three presentations that were well received. Fall Into Gardening, October 2025, closed the season on a high note. The presentations were engaging and created many comments and questions from the audience. The different features of the event were greatly appreciated: Ask A Master Gardner and Soil Testing are always the first to receive attention. Of course, any success would not have been possible without a great crew of volunteers! We are looking forward to Garden Discovery Day in March. Soil Testing received a new set of test equipment that was much needed. The purchase was facilitated by Sheryl Williams, who will be assisting the team in 2026. Spring Garden Fair - Our Annual Fundraiser.

The 2025 Fair was a success measured by the following stats:

- 6813 (1264 more than 2024!)
- Saturday saw over 3000 folks through the gate, and our pre-sale program worked well for the 2nd year.
- 198 volunteers filled 292 slots. This includes Master Gardeners and community members who stepped up to help out. (Thank you!)
- The Clinic had 434 people with questions, and we had 115 children stop by the newly renamed Kids Corner.
- Raffle sold 12,173 tickets
- 10-Minute University had 246 clients
- Soil Testing processed 407 samples from 198 clients
- Plant Check had 1066 customers.

And of course, we can’t forget our vendors - there would be no Fair without them! Our numbers are beginning to reach pre-pandemic levels again - in all we had 133 vendors, up 14 from 2024. 28 of those were new to our fair. *A special thank you to the Vendor Sales team for all the hard work supporting this year’s vendors.*

This year’s fair took place amid construction at the Fairgrounds, but it was mostly smooth sailing. The weather could not have been more perfect with warm temperatures and mostly sunny skies. Your committee is hard at work planning our next event - so don’t forget to mark your calendars for the 2026 Fair - May 2 & 3.

End of the Oregon Trail Pioneer Garden



Jane Collier & Sharon Andrews lead this committee. There is a great crew in place that are excited and engaged in the work that is done in the gardens and at the Interpretive Center. Volunteers are in the gardens every other Wednesday beginning on April 1 through October 29, usually 10 - noon.

This year we had 17 perennials and 2 interns working 19 days in the garden. We hosted two apple tree pruning workshops for the 2025 cohort, collected and packaged seeds for sale in the interpretive center and set up a clinic during the Three Rivers Guild Festival of the Arts in August. Additionally, a blog is available that provides updates on current activities as well as detailed information about the plant species and the historical background of the gardens.

Native Plant Garden at Hopkins Demonstration Forest

This dedicated committee is responsible for overseeing the maintenance of three gardens.

- There is a native garden which has an informational kiosk with plant identification.
- The Everett Hall garden - this area was redesigned in 2024 with an emphasis on fire-wise landscaping. This year we added bark dust along with other tweaks and modifications as needed. In 2026 there are plans to evaluate the irrigation system and make needed adjustments.
- We have also begun maintaining the area around the Molalla log house in the forest.

Other committee activities include Tree School in the spring for Clackamas Community College and an OSU Extension clinic. This usually involves 11 volunteers/ 30+ hours.

At Spring Garden Fair, we put together an educational exhibit in the 4H Building that includes information on native plants and their



advantages along with a display on fire-wise landscaping. The group was also involved with tours of Mary’s Woods and the Hopkins Demo Forest along with hosting a regional Metro Master Gardener meeting in August. In all, volunteers worked 158 hours in 2025.

Work parties are groups of around 4 - 8 volunteers. Workdays are on the third Monday of the month, April through October for 2 – 3 hours. If you would like to be involved, please contact [Janna Christensen](#) or just stop by! <https://cmastergardeners.org/hopkins-garden/>

Grow an Extra Row Giving and Learning Garden

As in previous years we donated to two food pantries in Oregon City: First Baptist H.O.P.E. Pantry and First Presbyterian H.O.P.E. Pantry. All the vegetables are grown from seed or transplants. Many of the transplants are grown by volunteers and planted in 29 garden beds.



produce was donated in 2025. (Approximately 1,000 pounds more than in 2024).

- This year we grew, harvested, and donated 4,059 pounds of organically grown produce from the garden.
- Donated produce of 1,590 pounds was also delivered to the two food pantries.
- In total 5,649.69 pounds of

- There were over 40 volunteers in the garden, Master Gardeners (including interns) and public gardeners.
- Master Gardener volunteers continue to raise starts for the garden, in addition to being volunteers at the garden.
- Total volunteer hours in the garden: 1,703.50.
- The group also hosted a hands-on workshop for interns with 11 in attendance.

Gray and Norrene Thompson Community Grants Project

The purpose of this project is to broaden Clackamas County Master Gardener Association's community service by providing seed money for projects which further the use of plants as food, as tools for education, as benefits to the environment, and as a means to beautify the community. This year's grant summary:

10-Minute University™

Our 10-Minute University team works tirelessly producing content to educate the public. They are involved in public online webinars, written handouts, articles, hands-on seminars to educate Master Gardeners and in-person talks to the public throughout the year. In total, contacts for 2025 was 19,009 people. This breaks down to 18,423 attending webinars, 243 questions answered via email and Spring Garden Fair classes attended by 343. There are many moving parts to this committee including speakers creating content that includes handouts, articles, and presentations - all of which are all peer-reviewed and edited for clarity. There is also a publicity team that takes care of getting the word out via the chapter webpage, social media, OSU outlets and other organizations in our area. And a newsletter goes out monthly that includes info on the webinars and much more.

There is also a team that produces and presents the webinars via Zoom. Nineteen were presented in 2025 and seventeen are slated for the 2026 Let's Grow Together series beginning on January 7.

We are all looking forward to seeing what is coming in the new year. Thank you all for your efforts, your excellence, and your gift to the community.
