Clackamas County Master Gardener Association Donations


Our fundraising efforts in 2025 enabled us to make several year-end donations directly to worthy programs and organizations in our local community.

- \$5,000 to the OSU Garden Ecology Lab, a program which does research on topics relevant to home gardeners.
- \$5,000 to the Clackamas Community College Miken Scholarship Endowment Fund for students in the horticulture program.
- \$3,000 to Milwaukie Community Center in support of their efforts in our community.
- \$2,000 to Oregon Extension in support the Master Gardener program.
- \$300 to Oregon Garden Club Association for a Gold Star Monument at Willamette Cemetery honoring veterans who are MIA or died in the line of duty.

Garden Discovery Day happens on Saturday, March 28, 2026 @ 9:00 am

Garden Discovery Day is an annual event for the public and a good way for Master Gardeners to log continuing education hours. This event offers a range of educational and engaging topics geared for the coming season. Featured are three 45 minute sessions on seasonal topics and 3-d interactive displays on subjects like tomato cultivation, blueberry care, soil preparation, ornamental planting, and tool maintenance. We also have pH soil testing, and an experts table for live gardening advice. Our chapter has sponsored this free event for over 15 years, with a pause during Covid, and starting back up in 2022.

Seed to Supper: An OSU Program focused on reducing food insecurity



Seed to Supper is an introductory vegetable gardening program for adults with limited budgets. Created in 2007 by the Oregon Food Bank and Oregon State University, the Oregon Food Bank managed it until 2020. In 2023, administration shifted to OSU Extension due to increased food delivery demands, and the program officially relaunched under OSU Extension in 2024.

The course runs for six weeks, typically meeting on the same day and time each week, with sessions lasting 1.5 to 2 hours. The format includes PowerPoint presentations, demonstrations, class activities, and Q&A sessions. Students participate in firsthand

activities either in the classroom or garden, depending on availability and weather conditions. The ideal training season spans six weeks from March through May. Certified Master Gardeners serve as trainers, with three trainers per team being optimal. The curriculum covers everything from initial garden preparation and cool-season gardening to the planting of warm-season crops.

Seed Donation from Baker Creek Heirloom Seeds



We have received a seed donation from Baker Creek Heirloom Seeds in Missouri. They specialize in heirloom and rare seeds. We received 81 packets: 10 packets of herbs, 22 packets of flowers, and 50 packets of vegetables. The estimated retail value is \$328.

Let Bill Dixon (wtdixon3@gmail.com) know if you are interested in any seeds from Baker Creek. There are about 300 seed packets left over from the prior three years of seed donations. Most of these will be used for Seed to Supper in 2026 but let him know if you need some for other programs.

We will also be donating another 150 seed packets from 2022 to the Oregon City Seed Library. Limited random testing still shows germination rates above 50%, sometimes still as high as 80%.

This past year, we distributed about 600 packets to:

- Seed to Supper participants
- Community gardens (Pioneer Community Center; and other gardeners at Westmoreland Manor, Hillside Manor, and Los Flores)
- OSU tabling events
- Clackamas County Master Gardener Association
- Oregon City Seed Library

10-Minute University™ Turns 20!

With the arrival of 2026, 10-Minute University, our flagship education program, turns 20. The idea for 10-Minute University started when Bill Bradley, an OSU Master Gardener and member of the Clackamas County Master Gardener Association, asked, "Why don't we offer gardening classes at the Spring Garden Fair?" Bill took this suggestion to the Fair's planning committee and successfully got their approval.

10-minute classes debuted at the 2006 Fair. Audience evaluation makes it clear that we had a winner! (see article on the right)

In the following years, Sherry Sheng assembled a team to expand the program. Classes were regularly held at the Oregon City Farmers' Market, gardening shows, and chapter events like Garden Discovery Day and Fall into Gardening, which increased awareness of OSU Master Gardeners and the Clackamas Master Gardener Association.

As our client base expanded, it became increasingly apparent that access to our services was limited. No single time could accommodate the needs of all interested participants. To address this challenge and enhance accessibility to our educational content, 10-Minute University developed a comprehensive library of [handouts](#) and [videos](#).

Spring Garden Fair adds free 10-minute University

You've bought a cartload of exciting plants. Now you're wondering what to do with them when you get home.

If you're shopping at the Spring Garden Fair in Canby next weekend, May 6 and 7, look for the orange and black signs. They will point you to free mini-classes on topics from growing vegetables to pruning.

Called the 10-Minute University, each class will be led by a veteran master gardener and include handouts. A 20-minute question-and-answer session will follow. Information about the OSU Extension master gardener program also will be available.

This year, the fair's 22nd, is the first time the fair has included classes, which are in addition to two master gardener clinics. The reason? After two hours of shopping, many people want to take a break, so why not give them a bit of education, says Bill Bradley, a Clackamas County master gardener whose

Bradley, who teaches the vegetable sampler class, knows he can't cover everything about vegetables in 10 minutes, so he's going to focus on growing tomatoes, peppers and

zucchini.

Classes will be held in Clackamas Hall, near the plant-pickup area and raffle booth. Classes will be announced over the loudspeaker 10 minutes before they begin.

The fair, sponsored by the Clackamas County chapter of master gardeners, runs 9 a.m.-5 p.m. May 6, 9 a.m.-4 p.m. May 7 at the Clackamas County fairgrounds. Admission is \$2 per person, under age 16 free. Parking is free. Shoppers are encouraged to bring their own wagons and carts. No pets are allowed.

More than 170 vendors will participate, with 85 percent in plant sales, 15 percent in garden art. More than 250 volunteers will keep the show going.

Proceeds from the fair support the Clackamas chapter, and fund two horticulture scholarships to Clackamas Community College and a scholarship endowment fund.
